A Note from Our Board of Trustees

I first met Jim Krisher, the Center's Director, when he gave an Advent presentation at my parish. Several years later when I was a prison chaplain at Cayuga Correctional Facility and heard that the Spiritual Renewal Center was involved in prison ministry, I asked Jim if he would provide some teaching and spiritual formation activities for my "men in green." Thus began a 15-year affiliation with the Center. Eventually, I received formal training in providing spiritual direction in the Center's two-year Horizons certificate program. This training helped me minister more fruitfully, not only to those imprisoned, but also to prison staff confronting their own struggles and dark places.

While the Center's on-site spiritual directors meet with over 250 people monthly, the Center's work extends even farther: training spiritual directors who take their skills back to their communities and churches (and prisons!), making our library of nearly 10,000 books available to anyone who walks through our doors, providing spiritual encouragement to men and women in prison, being a space for quiet and reflection.

What Does *Grace* Look Like?

Slowly, the frustrations with her job accumulated. What once was a great fit for her gifts and passions, started to chafe. As we met for spiritual direction, she talked about challenges to do her job faithfully and with integrity—seeing God's work in that but yet, weighed down by the challenge.

A new job opened up, teaching new Americans, refugees from around the world. She dug in, connecting with people from Afghanistan, Nigeria, Syria, China, and elsewhere. Joy enveloped her—she sensed in her bones that God had called her to this new task. She explained it this way: "You know when you get a new pair of shoes, and you have to break them in? Well, this is better than that. It's like a fantastic pair of new shoes that fits perfectly, right out of the box. No break-in period required!"

New shoes that fit perfectly.

That's what *Grace* feels like. +

Teresa of Avila and the Stages of Prayer

Teresa of Avila is one of the greatest mystical teachers of prayer in the Christian tradition. Cristobal will offer insights from Teresa on the different stages of prayer as we move towards union with God. He will draw primarily from her book *Interior Castle* and from other contemplative writers

to explore her metaphors of climbing a spiritual ladder gradually through the different mansions or dwelling places within the inner castle. Cristobal has followed the footsteps of Teresa and John of the Cross, having been born and raised in Spain himself. This presentation is open to all interested persons. We're sure you'll find it to be both inspiring and motivational.

Renowned Scholar Returns to the Center



Cristobal Serrán-Pagán, Ph.D., a prominent religious scholar and engaging teacher, returns to the Spiritual Renewal Center March 21-22 for two events – one open to the general public and the other for spiritual directors and pastoral ministers.


Cristobal is a professor of philosophy and religious studies at Valdosta State University in Georgia. His Ph.D. is in religious studies from Boston University, and he specializes in world religions and the history of philosophy. His work focuses on the teachings of the Spanish mystics and he is also a widely recognized expert on Thomas Merton.

His newly released book is *Saint John of the Cross: His Prophetic Mysticism in the Historical Context of Sixteenth-Century Spain*.

Spiritual Formation: Wisdom from Thomas Merton

Friday, March 22, 9:30 a.m. - 12 p.m.

In this workshop for spiritual directors and pastoral ministers, Cristobal will address the importance and practice of spiritual formation in the life and writings of Thomas Merton. Merton became a master of novices at his Trappist monastery, and he frequently stressed the need to actively educate the mind and the

heart, drawing on his monastic tradition. But Merton also learned from his interfaith dialogues with people of other religions, especially the Dalai Lama. Cristobal will compare some of their views on the role of spiritual formation and education and how relevant these teachings are for people in ministry today.
